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#### **4-H Record Book Basics**

Record Books should be named using the project type "Beef – Market" or "Horse" not by the name of the animal.

- Involvement Report This is an accumulative report, your community service should be recorded here as well as your record book.
- Goals & To Dos- Goals are age appropriate and project related. A senior level youth should have goals that are more challenging than a junior youth. To receive full points the youth should thoroughly explain what they did or did not do to achieve their goals.
  - Seniors 3 goals and 3 "to-dos" per goal
  - Intermediate 2 goals and 2 "to-dos" per goal
- Junior 1 goal and 3 "to-dos" per goal

  Demonstration For full points youth

should be thoroughly describing their demonstration with pictures included. **Seniors** – 6 + sentences

Seniors – 6 + sentences
Intermediate – 5 + sentences
Juniors – 2-4 sentences

- Project Information Page & Activity Log Should have more detail of what was discussed and/or activities of the meeting or event.
  - Expense, Income, Profit and Loss Detailed description in each column, entries for the duration of the project correctly use \$0.00 and totals are accurate. You should include the purchase price of your project animal, if it is raised from your own herd, you can include an estimated market value.
- 5. Animal Records Animals destined for EISF must be included here!
  - Market Animals Market Animal Health Record
  - Breeding Livestock Animal Information Page & Permanent Individual Animal Record

- Non-market animals such as horses or dogs – Animal Information Page & Permanent Individual Animal Record
- Horse Only Permanent 4-H Horse Identification & Health Record
- Market Production Summary This should include their estimated ADG and feed cost per lbs. of gain. Include all tag numbers for you project animals here, including animals destined for EISF.
- 4-H Story Should be well organized including introductory paragraph, conclusion paragraph and at least 3 discussion points.

Seniors – 2 + pages Intermediates – 1 ½ + pages Juniors – 1 + pages

 Photos – Should include at least 3-4 pictures throughout their project time period.

### **Verticillium Wilt of trees**

This past week I have fielded many questions concerning verticillium wilt of trees. As the weather gets hot and we get out disease and persists for 14 to enjoy our yards, we become much more observant of the health of our landscape trees. If you notice that some of the branches of a tree are dead or dying (wilting) while other branches are doing great, you may have verticillium problems. The causalagent of verticillium wilt in trees is primarily *Verticillium dahliae*, although *V*. albo-atrum and V. nonalfalfae also occur in certain areas. Trees infected with Verticillium cannot be cured and eventually die.

Proper irrigation and fertility can considerably prolong the life of the tree and limit further spread of the pathogen. The common trees we plant in this area that are susceptible are maple and ash. Verticillium is a po-

tato disease, and hence, in our area, we have a load of verticillium spores each year. It is a soil years.

The UI BUL 1043 states, "Sapwood infected with Verticillium also might have brown staining or that of dark olive green in maples (Figure 3) or yellow green in other hosts. Staining is difficult to see in young twigs and may be very patchy in an individual tree. ash trees rarely produce the wilting and sapwood discoloration that is commonly seen with maple."

Management of this disease is very difficult. Infected trees usually succumb in a matter of months or years. The best management practices surround maintaining a healthy tree and environment. Also plant pathogen free root stock. If you remove a dead tree due to

verticillium, you will need to plant a resistant type of tree since it will not be easy to eliminate the pathogen from the soil. Prune and burn infected branches to prolong tree life.



### Management for delayed first cut alfalfa

The first cut of alfalfa should occur at less than 5% bloom for maximum high-quality yields. There are also other issues that push us to recommend this harvest stage. As the crop matures during full flowering it will initiate the next flush of stem growth. If harvest is delayed for some reason, these stems can grow above our regular cutting height. Cutting late during full bloom will result in damage to the new shoots if you do not alter

cutting height.

If you are delayed, walk the field and determine the height of the new emerging shoots. Set your cutting height to do minimal damage to these shoots, as they are the basis of your second crop. If you cut off the new shoots, the alfalfa plant will have to initiate new bud and shoot growth. This is metabolically costly for the plant. It can reduce yield and stand longevity. It will result in a delay of a week

or more at the second cut. Remember, any stubble you leave behind has low feed value. I feel the yield you temporarily sacrifice is justified.

After passing around a Butte on right side of road proceed past Pollard Rd Proceed one more mile and turn right onto Windy Canyon Rd. There is no sign for road name. Proceed west about 2 1/2 miles passing the gravel pit road.

About 3/4 mile before shop at end of the road are the plots on the right or north side of the road. There is a

narrow field access point to enter the field.

\*\*Soda Springs Winter Dryland Trials: When entering Soda Springs turn right on 4th south street towards the Hospital and proceed south about 1/4 mile to stop sign. Turn right at stop sign and proceed on Reservoir Road and travel 1.6 miles passing the Dead End sign to Balls Road. Turn left to the south and go 1/2 mile south just passing the power line. Plots are on the left side of road to the east about 125 feet into field.
