Fusarium Head Blight Outlook 2025

One of the main fungal diseases of small grains we combat in Eastern Idaho is Fusarium Head Blight. It affects wheat, barley, oats, and triticale. It can cause significant yield reduction when the environment is optimal for its sporulation. This year looks like we will need to monitor for this pathogen and be ready to apply remedial fungicide applications in the Spring. There are a number of Fusarium fungi that cause this disease. The yield reduction is not the only problem when dealing with FHB because it is also associated with contamination by mycotoxins from the fungi that cause digestive problems for mammals. Grain exhibiting high levels of these vomitoxins will be restricted and not sold.

Wikipedia has good information on the disease cycle, "Fusarium fungi can overwinter as saprotrophs in the soil or on crop debris that can serve as inoculum for the following crop. The fungus can also spread via infected seed. The presence of Fusarium fungi on crop debris or seed can cause Fusarium seedling blight and foot and root rot.[1] Later, infection of the heads can occur with spores spreading by rain splash from infected crop residues. Another major infection route is airborne inoculum as spores can travel long distances with the wind.[4] The cereal crop is most susceptible at flowering and the probability of infection rises with high moisture and humidity at flowering."

Dr. Marshall has developed the fungicide timing recommendations below:

 Spring Barley- The optimum time to apply a single fungicide for FHB and DON in spring barley is at Feekes growth stage 10.5, when 100% of the main heads have fully emerged and up to seven days after.

- Winter Barley- The optimum time to apply a single fungicide for FHB and DON in winter barley is 6 days after Feekes growth stage 10.5, when 100% of the main heads have fully emerged.
- Wheat- The optimum time to apply a single fungicide for FHB and DON in wheat is at Feekes growth stage 10.51, when 50% of the main tillers have reached early anthesis (flowering) and up to seven days after.



Mature trees normally do not need to be fertilized separately if you fertilize the lawn around them. Unless a soil sampling shows a deficiency of a specific nutrient, or unless the plants are showing signs of stress, we do not recommend extra fertilizer most years. If your tree does need fertilizer, the time to apply would be spring. Applying fertilizer in Fall can encourage growth. Fall growth is not to be encouraged. Fall growth can lead to reduced hardening off in the fall and increase the tree's susceptibility to winter kill. Plan on fertilizing before the plant begins its period of vigorous growth in the spring of the year.

Fertilizing landscape trees

Here are some rules of thumb for fertilizing trees. Remember that landscape trees do not need to be fertilized every year unless a soil fertility analysis recommends fertilizer, or your tree shows signs of fertilizer deficiency, such as slow growth or leaf abnormalities. The most common nutrient deficiency of landscape trees is iron chlorosis due to the elevated pH of our soils which causes iron to be difficult for plant uptake. Since iron becomes unavailable in our soils, I recommend applying chelated forms of iron.

For landscape trees a rule of thumb in pounds is: apply 1 pound of 20-15-15 fertilizer per every 100

square feet of root area. If using 10 -10-10 fertilizer, apply 1 pound of fertilizer for every inch of trunk diameter; then increase to 2 pounds of fertilizer for every inch of trunk over 6 inches of trunk diameter.

One last note. Landscape trees do not survive without special care. Trees, especially evergreen trees, need deep infrequent watering, and this irrigation needs to be in place anytime the tree is respiring. Evergreen trees respire quite a bit during the winter, and so deep fall and early spring watering is always critical to replace moisture and ensure tree survival.

- 4. Have applied to enroll with intent to attend any college or university, trade school, or have a plan to join the US Military.
- 5. The scholarship recipient MUST BE PRESENT at the Bingham County livestock sale to receive the scholarship.
- 6. The application must be complete and correct once submitted for consideration. Any application deemed incomplete or incorrect will be disqualified from consideration.
- 7. Applications must be submitted to the Bingham County 4-H office by 11:59 PM MST by June 15th.


